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From the Manse

We feel, at last, to be at the change of seasons. A little more daylight, a brighter blue sky, a little more warmth in the sun – at least for today. It is no wonder we Brits like to talk about our weather because it is changeable and unpredictable and sometimes you don't know from one day to the next what is going to happen.

To me, that sums up Holy Week as well. It is a week that starts so well, on a high on Palm Sunday, with cheers and *Hosannas*, as Jesus rides on a donkey into Jerusalem, and we end on a different kind of high, with Easter Sunday as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus, after Mary finds the empty tomb, but in between it is so changeable, so unpredictable. Jesus' own behaviour erratic and so different from his usual.

On Monday, he upsets the tables in the Temple before going on to heal people. Upsetting the traders with the former, and the priests with the latter. His friends are twitchy, watching as he walks a dangerous line. On Tuesday, he curses a fig tree for having no figs, when it was outside the usual season for them anyway. He upsets the powers-that-be, speaks out against their privileged position, accuses them of not caring for the least in society, of being too concerned with the letter of the law to be of any earthly good.

On Thursday, his friends are fractious, cracking under the strain. He sends a couple to go and prepare a meal for them all. Over bread and wine and blessing he talks of his body breaking and bleeding, and he wants them to eat the bread and drink from his cup of suffering. It's all too much. They lash out at one another, fingers point, and accusations fly; they fight for top position on what feels like a sinking ship. His words, though quiet, cut through the conversation. He speaks of God's kingdom, built on loving service: seeing, hearing those ignored and unheard, and making space at the table for all. He's being radical again - he needs to watch out - that kind of talk will get him killed.

Then out, for a walk after the meal, to the garden of Gethsemane, a peaceful, prayerful place, although the disciples find more peace



rather than prayer as they succumb to sleep, whilst Jesus prays, his heart full of sorrow. He finally finds peace, accepting the Father's will, as the peace of the garden is disturbed by the arrival of an armed guard.

Taken away, to the council, and to Pilate, accused by false witnesses, abandoned by his friends, swapped on a prisoner exchange for Barabbas, the murderer, condemned to die, although Pilate found him innocent of any crime. The saviour of the world was condemned, verbally and physically abused, before being put to death in the cruellest way ever known to mankind. And the heartbroken women watched on from the distance.

The sorrow, the pain, the separation as he bore our sin, and died, alone, on the cross. The desolation of his disciples, the heartbreak for the women watching on, the unexpected care of the Pharisee, Joseph of Arimathea. The low of Saturday, when all seemed hopeless; for it was over, he was no more.

And then, the amazing news early on the Sunday morning, the tomb was empty, his grave clothes left behind, a voice in the garden, calling Mary's name. A voice she recognised, the Master's. The Disciples, afraid, uncertain, unsure, but suddenly the Master's presence. "Peace be with you" he said.

What a turbulent, troubled, unpredictable week. What highs and lows, what joys and sorrows.

The God of the Resurrection rolled the stone away.

The Creator God brought us from darkness into the light.

The Lifegiving Spirit moves among us, making us a new creation.

In His dying, Jesus destroyed our death,

in his rising, he restored our life,

in his living among us, he transformed our life.

By your will, and because of your boundless love for us,

We find ourselves standing on the threshold

Between old creation and new,

Looking at a world filled with your life and love.

By your grace, walk with us into Easter, and beyond,

Help us to see where, even amid the shadows of the old life.

Your new life awaits us;

Help us, every day, to embrace hope rather than fear,

Joy rather than anger,

Life rather than death,

All in the name of Christ.

Who died on our behalf, and rose to show us the way,

And who taught us to live and pray with joy, saying, "Our Father..."

I wish you a happy and hopeful Easter, full of the joy and the love of the Lord Jesus. Whether you celebrate alone or with family or friends, may you walk with Jesus, full of his love, his joy, and his peace, and may the blessing of the Holy Spirit be yours this Easter time and always.

Ladies In Fellowship Together (LIFT)




Some of you may have heard of LIFT but wondered what on earth it is!




Items that are in short supply at the moment are: UHT Milk, diluting juice, tinned meat, crisps, sanitary products and deodorant.
