From the Manse



It is only a few weeks since the clocks went back and yet already Mylo and I are again having to get dressed for a walk in the dark in the mornings. Generally, I'm well hidden in a black jacket, although with a head torch on my hat, whilst Mylo is resplendent in a fluorescent and reflective orange harness, with a bright red LED collar around his neck. Instead of getting annoyed about the creeping darkness in the late afternoon, or the pitch-black mornings, I'm wrapping up, facing them head on and enjoying the rare treat of a glorious sunrise on our way home.

When the trees lose their leaves and it looks like they are readying themselves to sleep through winter, remember that they are only letting go of all that no longer gives them life, and moving their energy deep into the fertile earth, to tend their roots, and converse with the primordial, relishing the treasure that lies far below what we can see, their hidden treasure found only in the dark. Remember that deep in the earth the spring bulbs are resting, waiting for the warmth of spring after the chill of winter; that life is there, dormant, but there nonetheless.

As the days shorten, and the darkness increases, we too settle down, often with a book or a good film. We set down our roots, and let our spent leaves go. We nestle into the darkness, maybe under a throw or two, like the creatures of the earth that we are and we wait. When we sit and rest and relax, we let go of the stress and strains of life, and we wait in this dark season of the soul.

When waiting in near darkness, remember that the light will come, that every year around Christmas, the days start to get longer – and we are truly blessed when we remember Jesus, the light of the world,

who came into the world to save us. As our Church Christmas card reminds us this year – "Jesus is the reason." Without the baby Jesus, there would be nothing to celebrate, no parties, no presents, no trees, no turkey.

As we celebrate amidst the bright lights and cheer of Christmas, remember that some still sit in darkness, that, for some, Christmas is a sad time, a time full of memories of those whom we have loved and lost, of empty seats around the table, of children grown up and gone, living in different parts of the country, or even across the world.

Remember that many are far from home, not through choice. Many have had to flee their homes because of war or conflict, fire, flooding or other natural disaster. Remember that this Christmas many will go hungry, or be cold, or lonely.

And give thanks for all you have, all you hold dear, and give thanks to God for the precious gift of his Son Jesus, who came to earth as a vulnerable baby, grew up in a loving caring family, and went on to teach us about God's kingdom here on earth.

Remember, Jesus is the reason and enjoy your Christmastide.

I hope you all have a happy Christmas and enjoy a peaceful New Year, and I hope you can join us at one of the Christmas services,

Session Report



The Dementia-Friendly Café was going well and we had also established a warm spaces facility where people could meet, have some soup and baking and a cuppa. It is early days for this but, along with several other groups, for example the Salvation Army, we hope to help provide places throughout the town where people can gather together for socialising, fellowship and keeping warm.

There will be a bereavement service held on Sunday 4th of December and our annual gift service will be on the 11th.

All of the trustees took part in Safeguarding Training on 21st November. This is a vitally important part of our work as it applies to children and vulnerable groups and, as the church hosts several of these in different guises, it is essential that everyone is aware of the types of abuse which may go on and the process for how we deal with it. We must all be vigilant and report any suspicions.

The plans for the church café are going ahead and we are extremely grateful to Jok Everett, Andy Grant, Graeme Wright and Peter Blair for all the preparatory work they have undertaken laying down pipes, plumbing and wiring to enable things to progress when we get final planning approval.





Lastly, as you are aware, Clyde presbytery have decreed that we should amalgamate with Sherwood Greenlaw. Plans for this are at a very early stage and nothing definite has been agreed. We continue to work together as Christian churches to facilitate shared interests and groups and had a recent pulpit exchange when John Murning preached at St. Mark's and Sonia spoke at Sherwood. We await further input from presbytery, but expect not much to happen for some considerable time.




