From the Manse



As I write this, I am also preparing for our Harvest Thanksgiving which will take place on the 17th September - not a date for your diary by the time you read this you will have missed it if you weren't there. On that Sunday we thought about the growth of a sunflower seed, and the way it is transformed within the soil, and of the Parable of the Sower. This parable may be one you are familiar with- some of the seed falling on the path, and being eaten by the birds ; some falling on the rocky ground and starting to grow, but not having much soil to take root in ; some falling amongst thorns and the plants being choked as they grow and some falling on good soil, and growing well, and flourishing, giving a good crop.

Later, when Jesus explained the parable, he did so to the disciples and not to the entire crowd. And he told the disciples that they were able to understand what he called the 'secrets of the kingdom' but that this knowledge was not for everyone.

He quoted the words of the prophet Isaiah who said :

"You will listen, but never understand, and you will look but never perceive.

For this peoples' heart has grown dull, and their ears hard of hearing,

And they have shut their eyes." (from *Isaiah* 6)

Today, just as in the time of Isaiah, and later in the time of Jesus, many people are not hearing or seeing properly. There is a tendency to look at the problems of the world, of homelessness, poverty, famine and think they are too big, too difficult for us to do anything about, and so we do not try. We may recognise that there is a huge problem with climate change, maybe even call it a crisis, but think if we throw a few items in the recycling bin we are doing our bit.

Jesus said that those who hear the word of God but do not understand, and those who hear the word of God but who are distracted by other things, will fall away. But those who hear God's word and understand it will bear fruit. In hearing God's word and responding to the word of God in our lives not only do we help others, but we ourselves are blessed.

This autumn, I challenge you to think again of the Harvest.

- Think of the seed that fell on good ground, and about the sunflower seed, and how a small seed can be transformed.
- Think about how you can make a difference in our world, to our brothers and sister close at hand and far way, how you can, in the words of the prophet Micah, " Do justice, and love kindness and walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)

That is the Harvest of our lives, the harvest that God desires.

Our Harvest gifts, both financial and practical went to the Renfrewshire Foodbank ; other donations were given for the work of Christian Aid. If you weren't at the Harvest service, perhaps you might consider giving a donation to one of these charities now.

Finally, in closing, a Prayer for a rich harvest :

Lord Jesus,

Like the sower you scatter seed to bring about a harvest, spreading the seed of love, kindness and truth:

You water the seed with your grace and warm it with your compassion.

May that seed germinate and take root in us. Nurtured by your Spirit, may it grow to a rich harvest of lives that delight in your truth, that show love in word and action and that care for all with whom we share this earth.

Welcome and Hospitality

Over the summer we have had the opportunity to welcome many visitors to our Sunday morning Worship. Some have been family members, some friends who were visiting, others people quite unknown to us, and it has been a delight to welcome them.

There are also new people from the local area who are worshipping with us on a Sunday and they are most welcome, and I would encourage you to take a moment and speak to them before or after a service. If it happens that you speak to someone whom you don't know but who has been a member of St Mark's for years, then just be glad that you have met a brother or sister who was previously unknown to you.

We are currently hosting both the Paisley Church of the Nazarene, and the Kingdom Ambassadors Ministry who are worshipping in our building on a Sunday afternoon. Both these churches were previously worshipping within the building of the Life Church, but they have moved out of their old building, and their new building is not yet ready for occupation, so they themselves are worshipping within the Central Methodist Hall. The Church of the Nazarene will meet in the church sanctuary at 2pm, and the Kingdom Ambassadors in the large hall from 1pm onwards. We pray a blessing on them as they worship within our building. We recognise that many people from Ralston use the church paths as a regular way of passing from Corrie Drive to Glasgow Road, and have done so since the church was built. We wish to be known as friendly and welcoming by the local community, and so we should not have a problem with people or dogs walking around the paths or the grass - as long as no damage is being done, and no dog mess left behind. Sadly, this does not appear always to be the case, as we have heard of people being 'told off' and informed that the church's paths are 'private property'. Whilst the church does own the paths and has responsibility for the upkeep, there is no law of trespass in Scotland, and there are no gates or fences to keep people out, so the Kirk Session wish to remind the congregation that no-one should be challenged for walking along these paths, even on a Sunday morning, but instead perhaps we can greet our neighbours with a smile, and a friendly word, and maybe even an invitation to step inside. However, if there is a problem, and you witness it, please let me know and I can respond appropriately if the issue is raised with me at a later date.

We hope to begin our *Winter Welcome* project again this year utilising the new café space. More details as autumn progresses. We are waiting for the kitchen being installed before we begin.

Saint Ninian

Saint Ninian probably lived from about 360 to 432AD. Little is known for sure about his background, origins and early life. It is said, however, that he was British, and that he studied Christianity in Rome, being given the mission of converting the Picts by Pope of the day, Pope Siricius.

St Ninian is not a Celtic Saint, he is a Northumbrian Saint, the first evidence about him coming from the Venerable Bede, a Northumbrian Monk writing some 300 years later. He wrote: "the southern Picts received the true faith by the preaching of Bishop Ninias, a most reverend and holy man of the British nation, who bad been regularly instructed at Rome in the faith and mysteries of the truth; whose episcopal see, named after St Martin the Bishop. (St Martin of Tours) and famous for a church dedicated to him (wherein Ninias himself and many other saints rest in the body), is now in the possession of the English nation. The place belongs to the province of the Bernicians and is commonly called the Candida Casa, because he there built a church of stone. which was not usual amongst the Britons".

It would seem St Ninian came to Scotland in the 390s, establishing his mission at Whithorn. It became known as Candida Casa or "White House" because of the appearance of its stone construction. There appear to have been well- established links between the Northumbrians and Galloway, both under the oversight of the Northumbrian Archbishop of York. There is actually a lot of academic dispute about many of the details of St Ninian's life. This even includes the century in which he lived, with some believing Bede had confused him with St Finnian, who was a teacher of St Columba in 560. This is still a commonly held belief. However, others believe that St Ninian dedicated the



Candida Casa to St Martin on hearing of the latter's death, which would place the dedication of his church in 397.

Work among the Britons in modern day Galloway was followed by St Ninian's mission to the "southern Picts". Early maps were tipped on their side, so St Ninian's mission seems to have worked his way up the east coast of Scotland, possibly reaching as far as Shetland. As St Columba and others had to start afresh converting the Picts in the late 500s, it would seem that either St Ninian's Pictish converts returned to paganism after his departure, or possibly that Bede did indeed get his dates and identities confused, and St Ninian and St Columba were indeed operating at much the same time.

Either way, after his death St Ninian was buried in Whithorn. He is commemorated in the names of many churches, including St Ninian's Chapel at the isle of Whithorn, and St Ninian's cave on the shore south-west of Whithorn, has become a place of pilgrimage. He is also commemorated in the isle of Man, and in Northern Ireland.

As noted above, St Ninian is not a Celtic saint, but since I visited Whithorn during my summer travels I thought he deserved a mention.

The Dead




