From the Manse

As winter began to turn to spring (albeit with some snow!), this last month has seen a number of events where we have seen life breaking through in difficult circumstances. As we marked the one-year anniversary of the war in Ukraine, I have welcomed into the manse a family from Ukraine. As the government introduced new legislation unjustly punishing refugees, over 1000 church leaders from the UK demonstrated their opposition in a joint statement. As new life breaks through in spring flowers and trees beginning to bud, we are called to remember to look for signs of hope, even in challenging times.

Vitalii, Viktoriia, 10 year old Dasha, and baby Ivan arrived in Newtyle Road on the 28th February having driven the 3500km from Ukraine. As they get used to life in Scotland. Mylo and I are adapting to living with a family again! We are all exploring the cultural difference between the two countries and learning each other's languages - although their English is going much better than my Ukranian! I am enjoying introducing them to Scotland. For them, this is a place of real safety, and they are grateful for the welcome they have been shown. However, whilst they want to settle and contribute to this country, they hope for an end to the war, and the opportunity to return home, and help rebuild Ukraine.

The Moderator of the Church of Scotland, Right Rev. Dr Iain Greenshields, on our behalf, was one of over 1,000 Church leaders who signed a joint declaration to the UK government expressing opposition to the "Illegal Migration Bill". Part of it reads, "We are appalled by the proposals in the government's 'Illegal Migration Bill' to detain, punish and reject thousands of people seeking safety. They are completely incompatible with our Christian conviction that all human beings are made in the image of God, and are therefore inherently worthy of treatment which honours their dignity. Instead of dignity, these plans will foster discrimination and distrust, and cause immeasurable harm to people already made vulnerable by conflict and persecution. If ever there was a contemporary example of ignoring our neighbour and walking by on the other side, this is it.

When two in three people who cross the channel to seek sanctuary in the UK are granted asylum following rigorous checks, it seems unthinkable to reject them before they have even had a chance to have their claim for asylum heard. Many people fleeing war and persecution in countries such as Iraq, Iran, Syria, Eritrea and Sudan have been left with no safe and accessible routes to claim asylum in the UK, forcing people to make difficult and dangerous decisions. The UK falls far behind our global neighbours in welcoming people seeking sanctuary into our communities, and vet these plans essentially put a ban on claiming asylum and reject the UK's responsibility to play our part in responding to global inequalities and conflict."



I am reminded of the motto of Aberdeen University, which comes from Job 28, which we looked at recently. "Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." Fear of the Lord, not terror and that awful fear that accompanies it when your life is threatened, but fear, as in awe, reverence, and respect. We thought about wisdom, and read an earlier part of that same chapter, thinking about all the places wisdom isn't. Sadly, true wisdom is not necessarily found in the policy of any Government, but true wisdom belongs to God, and only when we are right with him. when we revere and respect him, then and only then, do we experience true wisdom for ourselves.

St Mungo had his priorities right when he said, "Let Glasgow flourish by the preaching of his word and the praising of his name." Researching Mungo recently, I was minded to share some of what I learned with you, but I decided I should begin a new series on 'Celtic Saints with local connections' with St Mirin, and I hope you enjoy reading this later in the *Marksman*.

For now, I wish that you find godly wisdom when you need it, plenty of hope for the future for you and your family, and a faith-filled Easter. I hope the series of readings for Holy Week helps you walk through that week with Jesus, and I pray that God will bless you as we celebrate this wonderful season of Easter together.

Holy Week

Use this guide to lead you through the events of Holy Week.



Palm Sunday 2nd April Read *Matthew 21:1–11*

Jesus rides into Jerusalem, perched on a colt. This was the first time since raising Lazarus from the dead that he had shown his face in the city.

The story of Lazarus's resurrection had circulated widely. Many regarded Jesus as a celebrity and threw palm branches in his path. Everyone wanted to catch a glimpse of him. They went out to meet him and received him like a King, because they heard he had done this.

Something to think about – How often do you praise God for coming into your life?

Praise to David's son! God bless him who comes in the name of the Lord! Praise God!

Monday 3rd April

Read *Matthew 21:12-22*

Jesus enters the Temple and is upset by all the activity going on there. He overturns the money-changers' tables and heals the sick.

Something to think about – Think about your body as the Temple of God. Is there something in you that needs to be cleansed by Jesus, or do you need his healing touch? Ask him for what you need.

My temple will be called a house of prayer. But you are making it a hideout for thieves.

Tuesday 4th April

Read *Matthew 21:18- 26:5* (or at least *21:18-27, 26:1-5*)

If Monday's arrival in the temple was an all-inclusive, living parable of cleansing God's house, Tuesday's entrance is a direct, verbal confrontation with the Jewish leadership. Jesus says he does not believe these leaders have any authority over him, and he spends the rest of the day in the temple teaching the people God's Word. By the time he leaves, the religious authorities are planning how they can be rid of him.

Something to think about - Have there been times when Jesus' truth has seemed harsh to you, or hard to follow? Did you grumble and back off, or did you speak with him about it?

The Pharisees went off and made a plan to trap Jesus with questions.

Wednesday 5th April Read Matthew 26:6-16

Jesus is in the home of Simon the Leper in Bethany. During the meal, a woman, Mary, comes to Jesus with an alabaster flask of perfume. She has been saving this perfume, worth a year's wages. She begins pouring it on Jesus's head and feet. She is offering Jesus everything she has.

Something to think about – What do you have that you can offer to Jesus? How can you honour him as Mary did?

...wherever this gospel is preached all over the world, what she has done will be told in memory of her.

Thursday 6th April Read Matthew 26:17-75

Jesus is preparing to celebrate the Passover with his disciples. As they begin to eat, Jesus announces one of them is about to betray him. Each wonders if he means them.

During this last supper, Jesus sets apart the Passover bread and cup and reassigns their meaning. The bread is his body; the cup, his blood. Then Jesus and his friends leave for the Mount of Olives to pray. But he is not there only to pray. He is also there to wait.

Soon, a line of torches snakes its way toward him in the darkness. This is what he has been waiting for.

Something to think about – Jesus told us to remember him when we break bread i.e. eat a meal. Do you give thanks before you eat? Think of the disciples. Jesus asked them to stay awake and be with him while he prayed, but they could not. Pray now, thanking him for all he has done for you.

Look! The hour has come for the Son of Man to be handed over to the power of sinful men.

Good Friday 7th April Read Matthew 27:1-61

On Thursday night in Gethsemane, Jesus was arrested betrayed by one of his disciples and abandoned by the others. The chief priests and the Sanhedrin called for secret trials in the dead of night, and the verdict handed down was that Jesus would be crucified. This is something the Roman Prefect, Pontius Pilate, reluctantly arranges.

After a severe beating, Jesus is nailed to a cross where he remains for six hours until dead. Later, as his body is moved to a borrowed grave, the women who have followed him around Galilee and watched over him all day continue their silent vigil.

Something to think about – The women sat in silence – spend some time in silence thinking of what Jesus went through for you.

Then they led him out to crucify him.

Saturday 8th April - The Forgotten Day

Read *Matthew 27:62-66*

Less is written about the Saturday following Jesus's crucifixion than any other in this week. Though we may not make much of this day, when we look at the few verses the Gospels give us about it, we find he was by no means forgotten by the chief priests who had handed him over to death.

During his earthly ministry, Jesus repeatedly said he would die in Jerusalem, yet on the third day rise again.

Of course, the chief priests had scoffed, but they did not forget it. On this middle day, between Good Friday and Easter Sunday, Jesus' prediction preoccupies their thoughts such that they simply cannot leave him alone, or dismiss out of hand the possibility that Jesus might know something they do not.

Something to think about – Think about all the things you remember that Jesus did, and consider why hearing about only a little of this might have made the chief priests worry.


So they left and made the tomb secure by putting a seal on the stone and leaving the guard on watch.

Resurrection Sunday 9th April Read Matthew 28:1-20

Early Sunday morning, some of Jesus's friends set out for his grave to anoint the body of their friend and teacher. When they arrive, however, they are greeted by what one Gospel writer calls "a man dressed in lightning." He tells them Jesus is not there. He is risen. Later Jesus meets his disciples, gives them the great commission and reminds them that he will be with them always.

Something to think about – Give thanks to God that he did raise Jesus from the dead and that through his death and resurrection you can have eternal life with him, for your sins are truly forgiven, and you are washed clean.

He is not here; he has been raised, just as he said.

But that Christ on this Crosse, did rise and fall,

1 Thessalonians 5:11 "So encourage each other and give each other strength, just as you are doing now."


The Company is looking forward to welcoming our neighbours from the 22nd Paisley (Sherwood Greenlaw) before Easter.

Celtic Saints with local connections

Saint Mirin lived from 565 to 620. He is also known as Saint Mirren, Merinus, Merryn and Meadhrán. He was an Irish monk and missionary who founded a religious community in Scotland that indirectly went on to become Paisley Abbey. As a result, he is viewed as the patron saint of Paisley.

St Mirin was born in Ireland, into a noble family. While still young, he was admitted to the monastery at Bangor Abbey in County Down, where he studied under the guidance of St Comgall.

Mirin later became the prior of Bangor Abbey. Legend has it that Mirin performed a miracle (of sorts) when he was refused permission to preach the gospel by the High King of Ireland. The queen was heavily pregnant, and Mirin is said to have prayed to God to have the king suffer from his wife's labour pains. The king fell ill and roared with pain for three days and nights. Mirin was sent for and, on 'curing' the king, was given the permission he wanted to preach. Clearly not a saint to be messed with!

Mirin later travelled to what is now west central Scotland and, with the permission of the local chieftain, established a small church near the White Cart Water some miles south of the River Clyde, probably in Seedhill.

Little is known of Mirin's activities in Scotland but, after he died, the shrine to Saint Mirin that was created there became a place of pilgrimage and what is now the town of Paisley grew up around it.

In 1163 Walter Fitzalan, the High Steward of Scotland, founded a Cluniac priory on land he owned in Renfrewshire. This became Paisley Abbey and was not far from the site of Saint Mirin's earlier church.

The priory was dedicated jointly to Saint Mirin and to Saint Milburga, the patron saint of Wenlock in Shropshire, where the first thirteen monks came from.

It is said that Paisley Abbey at this time housed the relics of St Mirin, and it continued to be an important centre of pilgrimage.





In 1488 King James
IV issued a charter
granting Paisley the status
of Burgh of Barony. One of
the reasons given was "the
singular respect we have
for the glorious confessor,
Saint Mirin". Saint Mirin is
today remembered in the
St Mirin Chapel in Paisley
Abbey and in the Roman
Catholic St Mirin's
Cathedral.

Paisley's football club is called St Mirren F.C., and there is a Knockmurran ("Mirin's Hill") in Ayrshire, an Inchmurrin ("Mirin's Island") on Loch Lomond, and a St Mirin's Well near Kilsyth, as well as streets, (small) rivers, and a primary school named after him.

Social / Café – position 9 / 3 / 23

Hooray, we are now putting things back together and have glass in the windows, insulation, power, water, drainage and hope to have the disabled toilet, painting and the flooring finished by Easter, allowing the space to be used again and, importantly, in time for the Plant Sale on the 13th May 2023

The Café cannot open commercially yet until Presbytery and Trustees permissions are received, nor can the frontage window be fitted. Pop up cafés and the monthly Dementia-friendly café will nevertheless be able to use the space, as will those that used the room before.

The **Plant Sale** format will be like last year but using the new café space with plants and stalls out front on Glasgow Rd to make us more visible.

As well as community stalls, *Dr Bike* will attend, offering free cycle servicing and *Led Rides* by qualified staff, paid for by a Cycling Scotland grant to encourage cycling.

Bikes will be available for use, but please also bring your own and do let us know before if you want yours checked over by the Doctor.

How will the café run when finished?

We have engaged First Enterprise, a specialist business development firm with experience developing Church of Scotland Cafés, who will answers our questions and produce a Business Development Plan.

Answers will include card payments, banking, water rates, charity status, insurance, and lots else, so let us know what your questions are.

What will the café be like? How often will it open?

The café is successfully developing generically and it is anticipated this will continue but, to provide direction, we need to know what is wanted so do keep letting us know. So far it has wi-fi, toddlers' area, booths, upright chairs and tables, sofas and a picture rail to exhibit local artists' work.

Funding

Whilst a government Start-up Employment funding application has been declined, we have been told another can be reconsidered if supported with a Business Development Plan.

Separate funding applications will continue to be made for the front patio windows and the opportunity to **Buy a Brick** will, we hope, be in place for the plant sale.

Grant funding recently received will be used for cycle stands, a cycle repair station and providing gazebos, bunting, etc.

Session Report

At the session meeting on 14th March, the church accounts and OSCR report were agreed and will be presented at the Stated Annual Meeting after the morning service on Sunday 26th March.

We have had confirmation from Presbystery that we will be a 'shared parish' with Sherwood Greenlaw. This in effect will have little or no influence on our day-to-day working. Both churches have full time ministers and both buildings are in a good state of repair and so, although we will continue to work together with some shared services and joint working with our guilds and BB companies, we will remain separate churches.

This decision has to go to Edinburgh head office and then be sent back to Clyde Presbytery for final ratification - in June this year, it is hoped.

Our church café is progressing well and grateful thanks are due to Jok, Andy and Graeme and their helpers for all the work they have done.

It is hoped we will have the place up and running in time for our Plant Sale in early May. We also plan to have a bike station erected with 2 spaces for 4 bikes each and a small repair station on site to try and entice passing cyclists to stop and have a cuppa. There may also be the opportunity for members to take the loan of a bike for a short fitness run.

We await full permission to create patio style doors at the end of the Session Room to enable passersby to see into the café and perhaps encourage them to visit.



We continue with warm spaces until the end of this month, but the Dementia-friendly Café will continue as normal. The Film Club hopes to continue its monthly offerings so watch out for future promotions.

We are pleased that Simone Smith has agreed to be our Presbytery elder when Sandy Fergusson steps down at the end of his term and we are grateful to Sandy for the many hours he has spent in Presbytery meetings.

Christian Aid's two partners in Malawi are the Nandolo Farmers' Association (NFA) and Alliance Development African Foundation (ADAF). NFA helps farmers market their produce, form co-operatives and supports them to increase their pigeon pea harvests. ADAF helps farmers who cannot obtain traditional bank loans with access to loans, and brings people together in village savings and loan associations.

One of the people these organisations have helped is Esther Saizi. The 54-year-old grandmother grows pigeon peas, which she uses to bake bread and also sells, using some of the profits to help her daughters with nursing training and a carpentry business, as well as paying for grandchildren to attend nursery.

Esther has struggled to get a fair price for her produce and lost a lot of her crops during Tropical Storm Ana. She felt desperate. But when she joined a pigeon pea programme run by Nandolo Farmers' Association, and started selling as part of a cooperative, she was able to earn much more.

With the profits, Esther bought goats which also provide manure for her crops, saving on expensive fertiliser. She now keeps her peas in a warehouse, safe from floods and storms. She also processes pigeon peas into fish food using the cooperative's machine, which was provided by Christian Aid.

"We are a community that helps one another a lot," Esther said, "If people face a problem, we do not allow them to suffer alone."

This is how the money raised during Christian Aid Week can help:

- £50 could provide pigeon pea seeds and farming tools for a family.
- £70 could buy a bicycle so an experienced farmer can reach others in remote areas and teach them essential business skills.
- £250 could pay for a co-operative oven, supporting more than 800 people to turn their pigeon peas into profit by baking bread.

 £1,000 could pay for a fish food processor, so co-operatives can turn their pigeon peas into fish food and raise fish to sell.

Christian Aid works in some of the world's poorest communities. We act where there is great need, regardless of religion, supporting people to live a full life, free from poverty.

Making Sure Nobody Faces Dementia Alone Communicating With Someone Who Has Dementia: 12 Helpful Hints from Alzheimer Scotland

- 1. Be calm and patient.
- 2. Face the person, speak clearly and slowly.
- 3. Make sure that you have their attention by saying their name.
- 4. Use short, simple sentences and say exactly what you mean.
- 5. Try to get one idea across at a time.
- Allow plenty of time for the person to take in what you say and to reply.
- Try not to confuse or embarrass the person by correcting them bluntly.

- **8**. Use questions which ask for a simple answer.
- **9**. Don't ask questions which test their memory eg. What did you do yesterday?
- **10**. Talk about familiar people, places and ideas.
- 11. Use the names of the people you are talking about instead of 'he' or 'she'. It will remind the person who you are talking about.
- **12**. Use facial expressions and hand gestures to make yourself understood.









Food Parcels

In January we supplied the following parcels across our distributions:
Singles – 325
Couples – 85
Small Families (up to 4 people) - 96
Large Families (5+ people) – 36
Total - 542

These parcels provided 985 people with food. A total of 12,747kg of food, toiletries & cleaning products was distributed.

Comparing those figures to last January makes for pretty sad, but not surprising, reading. We have seen an 18% increase in food parcels issued and a 22% increase on people fed.

Donations

We have received incredible donations in the last month - 7,023kg of donations in January alone. These include 30kg of food which was brought by young Rebecca who made and sold Loom Bands to friends and family and an incredible £9000 from Pro-Life Fitness Centre. Cash donated goes towards paying for the fresh packs we provide.

Current needs

We have particular need for chocolate, multipacks of crisps, tomato ketchup and other sauces at this time.

Recipe Book

We are in the process of making up a recipe book using only items from the food parcels.

Distribution News

We are seeing significant numbers of Ukrainian Refugees attending the foodbank. The language barrier has been hard to navigate, but we now have Pascha, a young Ukrainian man, volunteering at the Paisley distribution centre. Pascha has already helped in the Warehouse/ Van on an ad hoc basis since arriving in Scotland in September last year.
